Holy Cross Goes Co-ed

fter the admission of girls **T**into Holy Cross for the first time in 2018, this school year marks the first time that the school is co-ed across all grades. With the commencement of the 2021-2022 school year and the arrival of the class of 2025, Holy Cross has finally become a fully school. co-ed Though Holy Cross was an all boys school for a great amount of time, this new period in the history of the school incredible marks an change with many opportunities. There have been many positive effects of the incorporation girls into the school community, indicating that this transition truly was the right choice for the school. The transition from an all boys school to a co-ed school is a huge transformation, one requires dedication and a lot of changes. For Holy Cross, this change has shown to be an immensely beneficial one, especially for the future of the school. The addition of girls into the school has helped the community in many ways, one being an overall increase in the number of students. With girls now being able to attend the school, many alumni families are eager to send both their daughters and sons to the school, clearly something that had not been the case in the past. The small Holy Cross community is well known, and now that girls are able to attend, it seems that class sizes are increastremendously. The open house in October alone had the greatest number of people attending than ever before, a large number of both male and female students. In addition, the freshman class is the largest class within the school, showing just how much the school is growing with the addition of girls to the school. Mr. Burns, the principal of Holy Cross and a prior student of the school, mentioned that since the inclusion of girls to the school "school spirit pride has stronger." become Holy Cross takes school spirit very seriously, our motto being "be HC", most definitely reflecting this idea. The addition of girls into the school has strengthened the schools sense of community, as more are welcomed to grow and become successful men and wom-

en at Holy Cross. As the Holy community continues more opportunities grow, are available to all students. More enrollment makes the school more attractive to families and overall helps to enhance all aspects of the school. When asked about the process of the transition to a fully co-ed community and the decision to make this transition, Mr. Burns explained, "The shift to co-ed felt like the right evolution for the school. Knowing we had the support and encouragement from our faculty, Congregation of Holy Cross, and the support of our local community is what made it seamless and successful." Support within the Holy Cross community is essential, and with a larger and more diverse community, the school is able to thrive now more than ever. Now that Holy Cross is fully co-ed, the first female students will graduate at the end of this school year in 2022. This event will make a very special mark on the future of Holy Cross, as the first group of female alumni will be created. The efforts to make the school co-ed will especially be considered as successful once the group of boys and girls alongside one another finally graduate. This pivotal point in the history of Holy Cross will truly mark the beginning of a new era, as from then on every graduating class will be full of both male and female nights. This transformation has looking to be achieved for years, and now it is finally here. Holy Cross is now, truly and officially, a fully co-ed high school; a place for everyone, both men and women, to thrive and 'Be HC'.


Q: Why are you running for class president for your grade?

Each year, the school offers a PSAT early on in the year. The Freshmen, Sophomores, and Juniors have recently taken one on October 13. However, in recent years, colleges have begun to reevaluate just how important students' SAT scores are. Students have been taking the SAT since it was first introduced to high schools in 1926.

It has been used by college admissions to determine whether or not a student is ready for college and helps award them with an academic scholarship. Yet, people in the last decade have been questioning just how necessary the exam is. Colleges such as the University of California have completely disregarded SAT scores when evaluating a student. Even world-renowned institutions such as New York University and Cornell have made submitting SAT scores optional. But why is this? Those who are against the SAT claim that it can lead to unfair biases, as statistics point to the fact that the majority of those who perform well on the exam are White and Asian-American. Another argument they make is that the SAT favors students who can afford to pay for a tutor or enroll in a studying program that helps them prepare for the exam. Some people believe that a more beneficial way to evaluate students would be through teacher recommendations and placing a greater emphasis on their grades and overall progress throughout their high school career. Nonetheless, even if colleges remove the SAT requirement, the majority of them will create their entrance exam that is not as adverse as the SAT.

Q: What do you like best about your cross country team?


A: I like my cross country team because we all treat one another as if we are family, and during a race, we all cheer each other on because we know how hard a race can be.
