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A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Several times during the Covid-19 pandemic we have marveled at the prescience of Blessed Fr. Basil Moreau, CSC, the Founder of the Congregation of Holy Cross. When he wrote in 1856, "How we educate the mind will change with the times: How we cultivate the heart is and will remain timeless," little did he know that one of the possible changes to educational methods would require the use of remote technologies, as of then uninvented.

During the first week of classes following the Christmas break, we at Holy Cross opted to ease back into the education of the mind using remote learning. The objective was to allow any lingering Covid-19 Omicron variant infections among our extended family to run their course. The reason for this decision was actually the second half of Moreau's observation. Our experience tells us that the cultivation of our students' hearts has always been when we follow our founder's guidance. That is when we are together, caring for each other, and sharing in one-another's successes and challenges. And we wanted to get together as soon as safely possible.

Mid-week during that first week in January, I had the opportunity to ask Mrs. Cathy Kenny, Science Dept. Chair, how her students were doing with the week of remote learning. She responded, "They are all logging in, participating, and doing their work ... but I can tell by the looks on their faces that they are wanting to be together to do the best of what we do." I believe Mrs. Kenny was truly echoing the second half of our Founder's view.

Much of what you will be reading in this issue of the Knights Newsflash focuses on the second half of that 1856 turn of phrase by Moreau. You will see photos of students accompanied by descriptions of their care and concern for each other and our community. You will have the opportunity to have your own heart cultivated by what you see. And, together, we can marvel at the timelessness of our Founder's words.

A LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Almost 24 months have passed since we first heard of Covid-19 and we all have had to adapt and grow as we have lived through the pandemic. I have seen our teachers, an incredible group of people, rethink their teaching style and methodologies in order to reach the young people they need to teach. Their passion and sheer determination to never give up on educating the hearts and minds of our students is what this issue of "The Knights Newsflash" celebrates. It is about how student engagement has been thoughtfully reimagined bringing strength to the educational environment by our faculty and staff.

It is about celebrating accomplishments and bringing hope to the school community. I am incredibly proud to share the following.

The science department rethought how students could engage in the science lab classroom with the introduction of Labster, a virtual science lab experience empowering the next generation of scientists by bringing the science lab to your Chromebook. Providing universal access to all students in person or remote.

The math department re-envisioned the use of technology to make sure classroom instruction was just as powerful remotely as in person. The idea of using screen share technology brought the Smart Board right to the students' Chromebooks. Enhanced with multiple pen color options so you could follow the problem solving steps easily with visual clarity.

The guidance department restructured the college planning process by utilizing Google Meets, Google Classroom, and Naviance to insure the college preparation process did not fall behind. All of this was enhanced with parent and student forums this fall. Providing a road map for our scholars as they undertook early acceptance, early decision, and college onsite acceptance days. We could not be prouder of our scholar's accomplishments. Their acceptance speaks to their success!

I would be remiss if I did not mention our Service Learning Program which never skipped a beat providing resources, comfort and hope to all who were in need. Our recent collaboration with the Little Saint Nick Foundation provided the student population the opportunity to help supply Cohen's Children's Hospital with comfort kits for children who are admitted to the hospital. This is just one of the many moments that our mission brought to life each day by our students and faculty to bring "Hope" to the community.




HOLY CROSS WALKATHON
















2021 NATIONAL HONORS SOCIETY CONVOCATION CEREMONY







At 1543 hours on July 25, 2020, Tower Ladder Company 107 was assigned second due to Brooklyn Box 3966 for a report of a fire with multiple addresses given. They arrived first due to the reported location due to other borough fire activity and street traffic. The outside vent firefighter alerted his officer to heavy smoke emanating from the top floor of the eight-story, fireproof building.

Lieutenant George Mueller and the inside team quickly made their way into the building, deciding to take the stairs due the unreliability of the elevator. As they ascended, they stopped on the sixth floor to size up the hallway layout. When members reached the eighth floor, they identified the apartment fire due to the dense black smoke pushing out from around the door frame.

The irons firefighter forced entry into the apartment, and members were immediately met with a thick wall of black smoke. Lieutenant Mueller directed his can firefighter to begin a left-handed search as he went right. With no guarantee of quick water, the irons firefighter stayed at the apartment door to act as a beacon for the searching members until relieved by the engine officer. All members of Ladder 107's inside team were aware of the challenges the building presented to engines getting a line into place because it did not have a standpipe. Lieutenant Mueller crawled down the interior apartment hallway with zero visibility in high-heat conditions. He made it into the living room area, where the main body of fire was located, and continued his search without the protection of the hose-line. He discovered an unconscious woman and transmitted a 10-45.

Using his body as a shield, Lieutenant Mueller turned the victim around and moved her to the door, where he handed her over. With Engine Company 225 still stretching the hose-line to his location, he reentered the apartment. Ladder 107's outside vent alerted the inside team to a person gasping for air at one of the windows, and the irons firefighter

gave a 10-45 for an unconscious male.

Lieutenant Mueller began his search in the same location, this time finding an unconscious young female beneath a mattress and other clutter. As he grabbed the victim, Engine Company 225 moved in to apply water to the main body of fire. He was met by the can firefighter, who assisted him out of the apartment and into the public hallway. A moment later, the irons firefighter gave a fourth 10-45 for an unconscious male located in a closet. Lieutenant Mueller and the can firefighter went back into the apartment to assist with removal of the victim.

Climbing eight stories of a fireproof multiple dwelling, on a hot summer day in full protective gear, is no easy task. Despite the debilitating conditions, Lieutenant Mueller maintained his composure and kept the incident

commander aware of conditions on the fire floor. He orchestrated multiple removals in punishing conditions. His selfless devotion and willingness to put himself in harm's way resulted in a positive outcome at this devastating fire. For his actions at this fire scene, he is awarded the Brooklyn Citizens Medal/FF Louis Valentino Award.

Jermaine Bishop '15

Congratulations to Jermaine Bishop who embarks on his professional career after signing with Phoenix Hagen in Germany's 16-team Pro A league.

Following his transfer from St. Louis University in 2018-19, Jermaine, who was sidelined for a season due to NCAA rules as a Division I transfer, completed his lone season with the Norfolk State Spartans where he averaged 15.6 points, 3.5 rebounds, 2.2 assists and 1.0 steals per game in 2019-20. He earned both NABC All-District 15 and BOXTOROW HBCU Division I All-America second team honors after setting the school record for 3-pointers (98) and topping the D-I record for

school record for 3-pointers (98) and topping the D-I record for free throw percentage (85.5).



Jermaine Bishop '15

As a freshman at Saint Louis University in 2015-16, Bishop played in 27 games with 16 starting assignments, averaging 8.9 points, 2.0 rebounds and 2.3 assists in 20.8 minutes per game. A three-time A-1 O Rookie of the Week honoree during that season, he was the first Billiken since 2009 to claim this honor. Jermaine led the Billikens in scoring (11.7 ppg) and assists (3.2 apg) in conference games, becoming the first Billiken freshman to lead his team in those categories since SLU joined the A-10 in 2005-06. His free-throw percentage (.864, 51-of-59) is sixth all-time in SLU history and is currently the top by any freshman in SLU history. He subsequently earned A-10 All- Rookie Team honors at the season's end.

Awards/Achievements in his college basketball career have been Atlantic 10 All-Rookie Team '16, CoSIDA NCAA Division I Academic All-District 3 Team '20, All-MEAC 1st Team '20, and NABC NCAA D1 All-District 15 2nd Team '20.

As a senior at Holy Cross, Jermaine averaged 20.6 points and 5.3 assists per game. He is HC's third all-time leading scorer in career points with 1,375, trailing only Sylven Landesberg '08 and Derrick Chievous '84, and is eighth in most points scored in a single season with 571.

"This is a great move for Jermaine, giving him European exposure instead of waiting for the Gleague in December. Jermaine is a hard worker, very focused, self-motivated and disciplined. I'm very proud of him, as are his parents, he continues to live his dream and he deserves it," said his former coach Terry Tarpey '83, Assistant Principal of Campus Life at Holy Cross.

Jermaine, who is headed overseas on August 21st, credits Holy Cross for laying the foundation of his basketball career. "Thanks to the SSP program, and my mentor, Michael Almonte (Class of 1998), I was able to attend Holy Cross and not only play and perform against the top schools in the league, but receive an excellent academic education as well. I know I'm still young, but I can say that my four years at Holy Cross were the best years of my life."

Michael Almonte's mutual admiration for Jermaine is evident as he remarks, "I am extremely proud of his accomplishments, both on the court and academically, but I'm even more proud of the man he's become. Love you Maine!"
