


A Word From Our Seniors

AUTISM AWARENESS 2022




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A Return to Theater

Picture this: it's a random Monday in late January and you're waiting on the lunch line with your friends as usual, when Mr. Kani approaches you to mention that he might be doing a play this year. When my friend, Jenny Drakoulias, and I first heard this news we were excited but not terribly convinced that it would actually happen. At the time the mask mandate was still enforced and we had just barely made it out of yet another spike in COVID cases, and when so many things are canceled over the past 3 years because of the pandemic, you start to lose hope. Who would have thought that only slightly over two months after this encounter, I would be falling through a window in a gigantic structure on the Holy Cross stage in front of an audience full of my teachers and peers?

After about 10 years without theater at Holy Cross, it was a shock to much of the community (including myself) that we were actually able to pull off such a complex play.

"Noises Off", written by Michael Frayn, is a comedy where all of the characters are trying to put on the play "Nothing On". Due to the fact that "Noises off" is a play within a play, it is highly confusing. To add to this complexity was the fact that the majority of the cast had to play two characters, one with a British accent when performing "Nothing On", and another when we played the real actors trying to put on their show. The cherry on top of everything occurs within the second act, when the entire set, complete with seven doors and a staircase, has to rotate to show the "backstage". This meant that this enormous wooden structure needed wheels strong enough to hold its weight throughout the show, and for the stage crew to flip it backwards and forwards between act one and two, and two and three. It seemed nearly impossible to me and most of the cast that such a monstrosity would ever be built in such a short amount of time, but Mr. Kani insisted to us that, one way or another, it would get done. However, he never promised that there wouldn't be set-

backs. The aim was to get most of the building done about two weeks before the play, yet, to our dismay, this proved to be impossible. This meant that we had to continue to practice a show where entrances and exits are the most essential part of the play without any doors or stairs built. This setback had been disappointing at the time and stressful as it complicated things, but we kept our heads up with the guidance of Mr. Kani and Ms. Gianna, and luckily we got through it. With the help of Deana Kani, William Maher, Anthony Nitti, Brian Killen, Jimmy Brosi, and Austin McManus, who all gave up their own time on weekends, we were able to complete the set on the Sunday right before opening. However, even then, the painting still needed to be done and



the wheels needed to be fixed before we could rotate the set. Our worries for weeks had panned out right before our eyes, but with the help of Mr. Ware and some of the cast over the weekend, the set was painted and finalized the day before the show. The wheels were not fixed until Wednesday, so we had to practice backwards at times, and eventually, we just began to pray that the wheels wouldn't collapse when we did rotate it. Through the help of the many connections within the Holy Cross community, Mr. Kani, Ms. Gianna, and Mr. Ware, and through quite a few miracles, the set was built and functioned safely throughout both of the shows. It truly took a village to reach this success. The malfunctioning and uncertainty of our set proved to be a challenge throughout the rehearsal process, but it truly showed how resilient our cast and crew was despite these challenges. A large part of "Noises Off" is consumed

by entrances and exits, and the comedic timing of these entrances and exits. Without a set, for weeks we mimed climbing up the stairs and opening and closing doors. Once we finally did get our set, we had all of our lines and cues memorized, but it had been a challenge to assimilate to the monstrosity on the stage. Gabriella Tesi and I wore heels for our costumes, which meant we had to practice running up and down stairs without falling and injuring ourselves. Jenny Drakoulias had to practice 'falling' on the second floor of the structure, a challenge in itself, and also falling down the stairs of the structure. Leah Gonzalez had to practice breaking in through a window, pushing down plexiglass over and over again, and Julia Muczynski had to practice replacing it. Paige Mahon and I had to figure out how to run down the stairs with sheets on, and Ripley Petrovic and Gabriella Tesi had to practice fighting one another while on the stairs. I also had to practice falling backwards through a window, which had its incidences. There was so much that we had to practice in the short period of time before the show that we were never able to practice without a set, yet somehow we did it. The rehearsal process for "Noises Off" began in February, with three to four rehearsals for the first few weeks after school until 4:30. Eventually, when there was only two weeks until the play we began rehearing every weekday after school. The first week, we rehearsed Monday through Friday after school until 6pm, many of us canceling other extracurriculars to devote our time to the play. During the final week, we rehearsed every day after school until 10pm, trying our best to complete homework without being sleep deprived and eating pizza at school until we became sick of it. It was rough spending so much time at school when many of us have other commitments and responsibilities, but it was an incredible test of our perseverance. I learned how to balance a thousand things at once and how to adapt to stressful situations through this experience, which is sure to be useful as I grow older and gain more responsibility. Being with the same people for hours on end every day allowed me to make connections and develop relationships with people who I had previously barely known. The development of "Noises Off" required an immense amount of communication and teamwork in order to get through the difficulties we experienced and to create a production worth seeing. There were times in which we became frustrated with one another and times where some of us wanted to walk away, but in the end we were able to work together and create a truly worthwhile show. However, this could not have been done

without the dedication of Ms. Gianna

and Mr. Kani. Both Ms. Gianna and Mr. Kani sacrificed their own time to allow us to fulfill our passions and indulge in our talents with "Noises Off". Through their direction, we were able to work together and create a chemistry on stage that was unmatched from anything I have ever experienced. They taught us how to communicate with one another and how to persist through every little bump in the road. The experiences and lessons that I have learned from these two truly exceptional people will never be forgotten. It was only through their hard work and faith in each and every one of us that we were able to create such a memorable production. In addition to Ms. Gianna and Mr. Kani were our incredible stage managers, Elizabeth Fazio and Ashley Altoro. Both Liz and Ashley came to every single rehearsal, giving the entire cast notes after each rehearsal and advising us on how to be the best performers we could possibly be. Though neither of them were shown on stage, they had just as big a part in the development of the play as everyone in the cast, if not, bigger. It takes a certain kind of individual to dedicate your own time to a production where the light doesn't shine directly on you, and Liz and Ashley were the perfect people for this job. Their enthusiasm and commitment to "Noises Off" was truly inspiring, and it would have been impossible to complete the show without them. Mr. Cochran was another individual who worked tirelessly behind the scenes on the soundboard. He stayed as late as we needed him throughout the last week of rehearsal, studying the script to understand when to turn our microphones on and off and when to cue the sound effects. Without Mr. Cochran, the audience would have never heard all of the

hilarious lines included throughout the play. On the last night of the show, my microphone had been malfunctioning less than an hour before the curtain was supposed to go up. I had been a wreck, worrying that my microphone would be broken throughout the show. Fortu



nately, through the help of Mr. Cochran and Mr. and Mrs. Vodopivec (who very graciously lended us the microphones), we were able to resolve the issue in time for the show. In addition to all of these people was Ms. Bucciarelli, who constructed a beautiful playbill that was impressive to both the audience and the cast members. Last, but most definitely not least, was the stage crew. Carlangelo Alessandro, Katherine Aboumoussa Armfield, Paula Herrera, and Daniel Wahed all contributed to the backstage workings of "Noises Off". Only being introduced into the environment during the last week, these four students stayed well into the night and were an essential part of creating a successful show. They handed us the numerous props, organized the set, flipped the stage backwards and forwards, and so much more. The stage crew along with Elizabeth and Ashley dedicated themselves to the show and through their selfless action allowed the show to run smoothly. When we realized that we only had one staircase and no way to get down the opposite side of the set, Carl was there to hold the ladder while we ran up and down to our entrances. When my fall through the window became a safety hazard after a few mishaps, Katherine, Paula, and Daniel were there to catch me from backstage. All of these individuals might not have been seen on stage, but without every single one of their efforts, "Noises Off' would have been truly impossible.

In my three years at Holy Cross I have Lhad a multitude of incredible experiences, but "Noises Off" most definitely is at the top of the list. It was not only an opportunity for me to pursue my passions, but it was a learning experience as well. Observing my fellow cast members-Paige Mahon, Gabriella Tesi, Jenny Drakoulias, Andrew Fazio, Ripley Petrovic, Julia Muczynski, Leah Gonzalez, and Kloe Pirovolikos- grow throughout the span of two months was a gift in itself. To see others my age be passionate about the same things that I am was tremendously rewarding. The end of "Noises Off" was bittersweet, as I will miss my role as Brooke/Vicki greatly, but I am sure that its impact on me will never be forgotten. The revival of the drama club at Holy Cross brought another type of art to the school and created a connectedness between students and teachers in an absolutely unique way. Though next years production won't be the same without our astounding seniors, Gabriella Tesi and Paige Mahon, I am incredibly excited to see the future of theatre at Holy Cross. "Noises Off" was just the beginning of a long legacy of theatre at Holy Cross, and I am eternally grateful to have been a part of such a remarkable experience. May "Noises Off" turn the noise on for a future full of theatrical productions for years to come at Holy Cross High School.


How do you feel about winning your first playoff game of the season?


