Task 1A: Locate a major topic that is examined within one of your chosen books. Discuss this topic, in depth, in relation to the overall plot of the text. Why is this topic important? In what ways do you relate to this topic? Your response should be no less than two paragraphs in length.	Task 2A: Write a book review for one of your chosen books. On a scale of 1-5, what would you rate this and why? Would you recommend this book to anyone? Why or why not? What was your favorite part? Least favorite part? Your response should be no less than one paragraph in length, including a "star rating" and picture.	Task 3A: Choose to write either a <i>prologue</i> (what happens <i>before</i> the book starts) or an <i>epilogue</i> (what happens after the book is completed). This should be both creative and relevant in relation to the plot of your chosen book. <i>Your response should be no</i> <i>less than two paragraphs in length.</i>
Task 1B: Discuss an overall <i>theme</i> (or message about life) that appears in your chosen book. How can this theme be relevant in today's society? <i>Your response should be no less</i> <i>than two paragraphs in length.</i>	Task 2B: Create a Google Slideshow presentation that displays the full plot of your chosen book. Your slideshow must include details regarding these stages of plot: exposition (background), rising action, climax, falling action, resolution (how the book ends). <i>Your presentation should be no less than 6 slides in length.</i>	Task 3B:Write a letter from the main characterto another character of your chosenbook. This letter can be aboutanything that makes sense within theparameters of the storyline. Yourletter should have a proper greeting,body, and closing. Your letter shouldbe no less than two paragraphs inlength.
Task 1C: Make an argument for a specific topic that appears within your chosen book. Your response should include a valid claim and reasons that your claim is valid. <i>Your</i> <i>response should be no less than two</i> <i>paragraphs in length.</i>	Task 2C: Choose ONE of the following writing strategies that appears most often in your book to discuss in depth: conflict, characterization, setting, theme, imagery. <i>Your response</i> <i>should be no less than one</i> <i>paragraph in length.</i>	Task 3C: Create a book cover AND a back blurb for one of your chosen books. This should be both creative and accurate in relation to the storyline of your book. Your cover must include the title and author, one catchy quote that appears in the book, and a captivating picture. The back blurb should consist of a several-sentence "teaser" of the main events of the book.
